






Community College Benefits – Low Cost


Annual Tuition for College in 2016/17

Completion Crisis by the Numbers

- Less than 40 percent of community college students graduate within in 6 years
- Low-income students are 7x less likely to graduate than their peers
- Dropping out is financially crippling 90 percent of community college students who have defaulted on debt left college with no degree or certificate



This is a crisis.



Barriers to Graduation

- 1. College costs
- 2. Academic under-preparation

3. Institutional obstacles

- Few resources per student
- Complex systems

4. Personal, non-academic obstacles

- Financial and family issues
- Planning & time management





- Comprehensive case management provided on campus
- Emergency financial assistance for nonacademic needs (up to \$1,500)




Results

RESULTS	Control Group (no CCFW services)	Treatment Group (CCFW services)
Still enrolled after 6 semesters (all)	23.8%	48.9%
Earned degree (all)	5.7%	22.3%
Still enrolled after 6 semesters (females)	13.4%	49.2%
Earned degree (females)	Less than 1%	31.5%

Still Enrolled After Six Semesters



Impact of STC After 6 Semesters






Earned Associates Degree – Fall 2013 Cohort




Impact of STC After 6 Semesters






Impact of EFA After 6 Semesters







- Stay the Course[™] is an evidence-backed solution in Tarrant County, yet the research continues
- Internal evaluation tests program variations
- Smaller-scale, evaluative projects help supplement LEO's research





Overall:

- STC participants are 4x more likely to graduate.
- Clients had an average passing rate of 93%.
- Our graduates earn nearly \$10,000 more per year.
- Fort Worth employers have a better workforce

Self-Sufficiency:

- Negative debt decreased by \$497
- Monthly stable income increased by \$161
- Monthly expenses decreased by \$222
